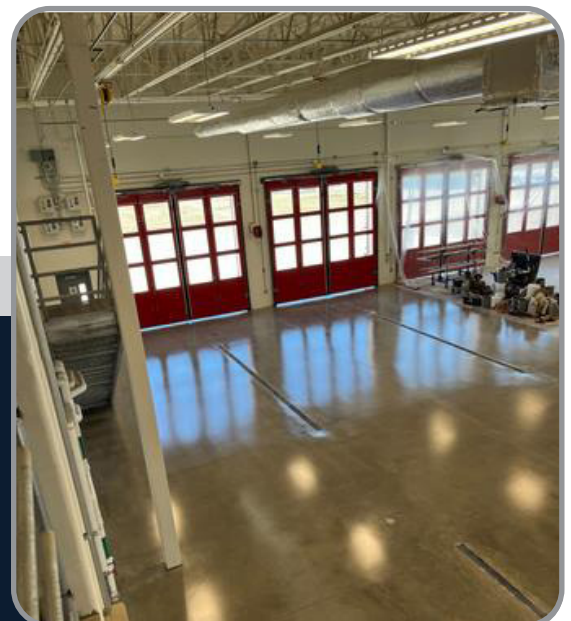
#### Station 24 Updates

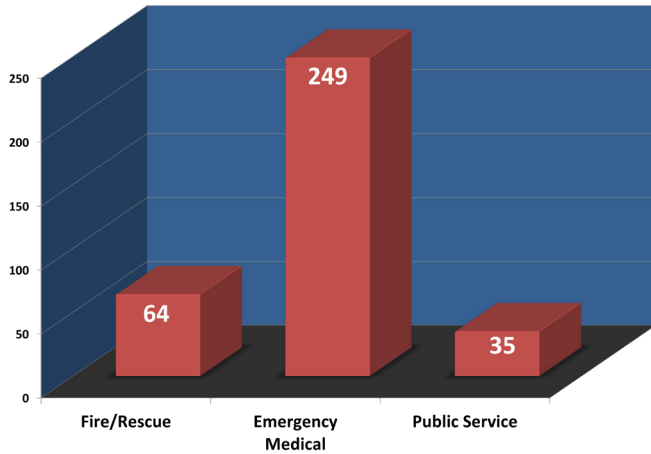

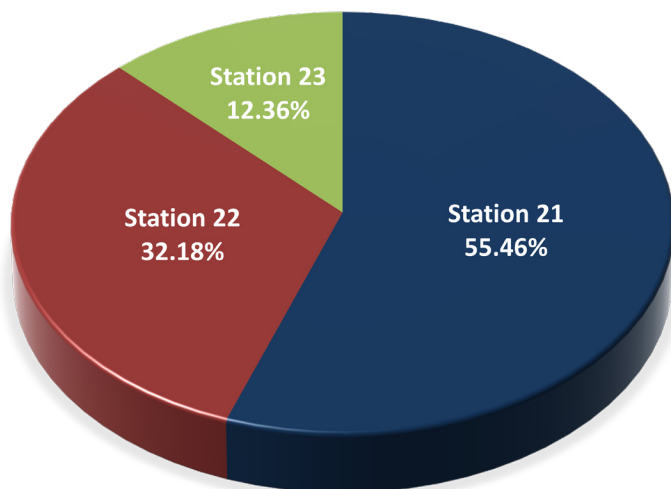
## Alarms by Service Type

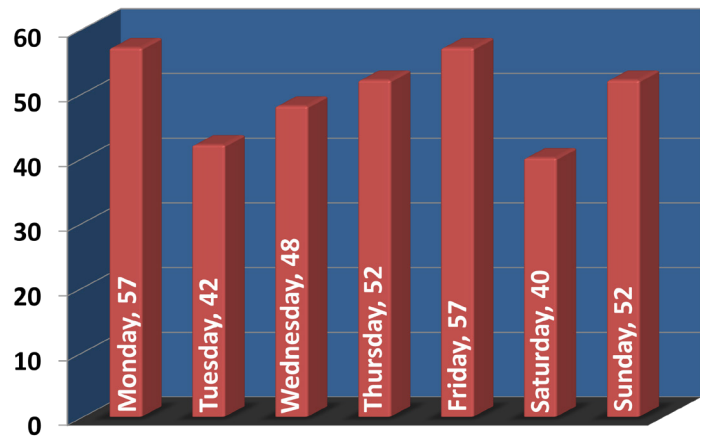
## Response Percentages

## Significant Responses

On 2/1/25 at 17:58 hours, crews responded to a nursing home for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest with staff performing CPR. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Kettering Health Main Campus.

On 2/2/25 at 19:55 hours, crews responded mutual aid into Franklin for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a residential structure with smoke showing from the roof. Crews assisted with fire suppression and overhaul until released by command.

On 2/3/25 at 13:58 hours, crews responded mutual aid into Lebanon for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found an apartment building with fire showing from the rear of the building. Crews assisted with fire suppression and overhaul. Crews mitigated hotspots and performed a secondary search until released by command.

On 2/8/25 at 09:00 hours, crews responded to a nursing home for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews determined the patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 2/18/25 at 12:15 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest with a family member performing CPR. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Atrium Medical Center.

On 2/22/25 at 11:23 hours, crews responded to Weidner Road for a reported passenger vehicle fire. Upon arrival, crews found a pickup truck with the cab area fully engulfed in flames and all occupants evacuated. Crews pulled a hose line and extinguished the fire. Finding no additional hazards, crews released the scene to Clearcreek PD. The estimated property damage due to the fire is \$5,500.



On 2/17/25 at 21:31 hours, crews responded mutual aid into Franklin Township for a reported motor vehicle accident with injuries. Upon arrival, crews found a pickup truck into a building with Franklin crews, Ohio State Patrol, and Warren County Building Department on-site. Franklin Township crews treated and transported all patients from the scene. After the State Patrol and Building Department completed investigation and assessment, Rescue 21 crews constructed a double T-shore to support the damaged structure. Once secured, crews released the scene back to Franklin Township units.





On 2/22/25 at 21:07 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient cardiac arrest. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Kettering Health Miamisburg.

On 2/23/25 at 11:29 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest with CPR in progress. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Miami Valley Hospital South.

On 2/25/25 at 02:00 hours, crews responded to a nursing home for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews found a patient in cardiac arrest with CPR in progress. Crews initiated ALS procedures with no response from the patient. Medical Control provided a field termination of resuscitation efforts order. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 2/27/28 at 11:30 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a two-story residence with smoke showing from the front door. Investigation showed a fire in the kitchen, which was mostly extinguished. Crews extinguished remaining fire using a hand line. Once extinguished, crews checked for extension and performed ventilation and overhaul. Miami Valley Fire District provided mutual aid assistance. The estimated property loss due to the fire is \$70,000.
