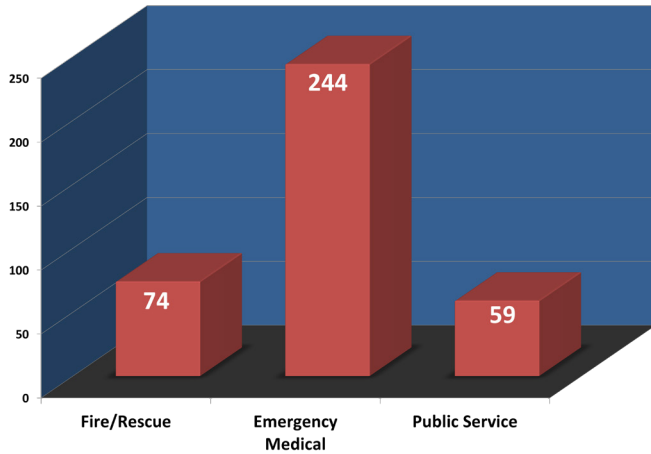

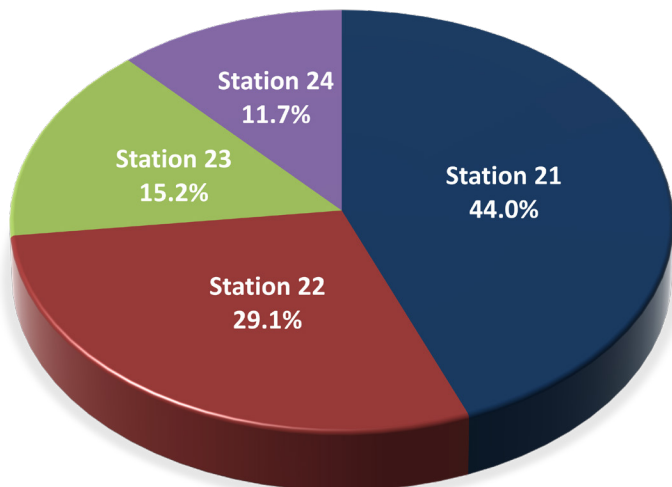
Alarms by Service Type

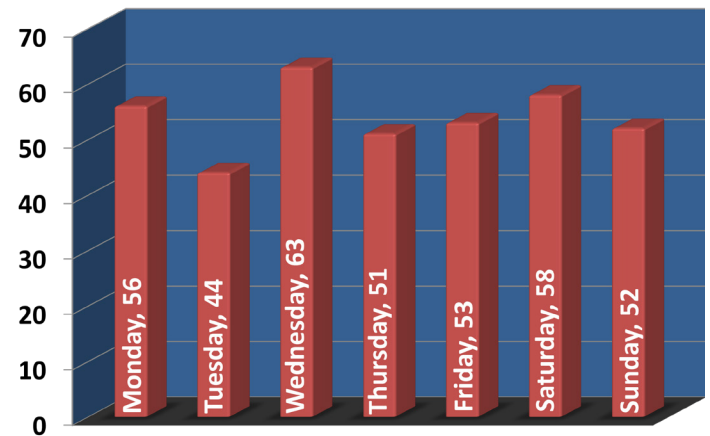
Response Percentages

Significant Responses

On 3/4/25 at 09:10 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews determined the patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 3/4/25 at 18:18 hours, crews responded to a residence to assist Clearcreek PD with a wellness check. Upon arrival, crews determined the patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Clearcreek PD.

On 3/13/25 at 10 :50 hours, crews responded mutual aid into Washington Township for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival crews found a residential building with active fire. Crews assisted with extinguishing the fire and overhaul until released by command.

On 3/13/25 at 20:04 hours, crews responded to a business for a reported building fire. Upon arrival, crews found a manufacturing facility with smoke haze inside the building. Occupants advised crew that there was a small fire in a machine that an employee put out using a fire extinguisher. Crews checked for extension and performed ventilation. Miami Valley Fire District provided mutual aid assistance.

On 3/15/25 at 13:24 hours, crews responded to a nursing home for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews determined the patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 3/25/25 at 17:55 hours, crews responded mutual aid into Wayne Township for a reported motor vehicle accident with injuries. Upon arrival, crews found four vehicles involved in a crash. All vehicles were stable, and all occupants evacuated. Crews assessed one patient who refused transport and transported another to Kettering Health Main Campus. Crews mitigated roadway hazards and transferred command to Wayne Township.

On 3/26/25 at 08:09 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. Upon arrival, crews determined the patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

On 3/28/25 at 16:21 hours, crews responded mutual aid into Wayne Township for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival, crews found a single-story commercial pole barn evacuated with smoke showing from the front door. Workers reported that a machine was on fire. Crews extinguished the fire using a hand line and performed ventilation until released by command.



On 3/29/25 at 03:13 hours, crews responded to a residence for a reported cardiac arrest. While en route, dispatch notified crews of two patients at the scene. Upon arrival, crews found one patient overdosed. Crews initiated ALS procedures and transported the patient to Atrium Medical Center. Crews determined the second patient was DOA. Crews contacted the coroner and released the scene to Springboro PD.

Fire and Rescue Training

EMS Training
