This report reflects the activities and achievements of the Clearcreek Fire District during 2011. This report is divided into many sections to reflect the various functions we engage in.

The department has placed a fleet replacement program into place. Our goal to better prepare for the expensive process of keeping our communities equipment in the best state of readiness we can. Each vehicle has the life expectancy laid out and allows us to prepare for these costly purchases. We have developed vehicle specifications and ordered our first new ambulance as part of this replacement program.

We have addressed staffing concerns to help bring us closer to compliance with National Fire Protection Association and industry standards for fire and EMS response. We explored options and changed our emergency response plan. We were awarded a Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response Grant. This \$1.8 million dollar grant has allowed for the addition of twelve full time firefighters and one lieutenant. This grant funds nearly all cost of these positions for two years. We then were able to reduce our cost of testing new part-time applicants by \$45,000 a year. We have never been able to fill all of our part-time positions. With the addition of these full-time personnel and this allowed us to reduce our reliance on part-time employees. While increasing staffing on a daily basis we have reduced overtime by nearly 60% from two years ago. Our average staffing is now fifteen per day compared to eleven two years ago. To help reduce cost our administrative positions work twenty four hour shifts every two weeks. This has resulted in 4300 hours being covered and reducing overtime cost, while increasing staffing. A fourth ambulance, Medic 24, is responding to emergencies within the fire district. This has reduced response times, reduced reliance on mutual aid and increased our ability to deliver service to our citizens.

Capital improvements to the fire stations have taken place with a roof replacement and heating and ventilation system replacement at station 21. We are continuing to work toward sewer placement at station 22. Four staff vehicles were also replaced as part of our capital improvement plan.

We obtained federal funding, \$87,000, for a vehicle exhaust capture system to improve the conditions in our stations. This system was installed on our entire diesel fleet. This reduces our soot and carbon monoxide emissions in the stations to improve the health and safety of our firefighters and visitors.


We had the resignation of Assistant Chief Morrison. We have begun a process to replace his position.

The Fire District is preparing our long range plan to include modernizing our current fire stations and expanding into a new station. The growth of our community places increased needs upon fire and EMS and we strive to meet that need, prepare for future need and utilize the public's dollars in the best manner possible,

Street Guides / Zone Books

The Fire District uses a GIS; zone mapping system was originally developed and implemented during 2004. Based on this system the Fire District is divided into 74 individual response zones containing over 829 different streets and roadways. These response zones are based on our existing fire station locations and response areas.

Clearcreek Fire District is dispatched by the Warren County Department of Emergency Services Communications Center. The Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system utilizes the Motorola Printrak Premier CAD™. This system uses a coordinate-based geofile; X, Y coordinates are assigned to each incident regardless if it has been initiated to an address, intersection, common place location, alarm location, or latitude/longitude. The Clearcreek Fire District Zone Mapping System integrates with this system.

Ongoing goals of the Clearcreek Fire District's GIS based Zone Mapping system is to continually simplify the mapping process, provide more accurate mapping, increase process efficiency, and work towards alignment and integration with possible future dynamic Advanced Tactical Mapping in our vehicle Mobile Data Computers (MDCs).

During 2007, the Clearcreek Fire District installed Mobile Data Computers (MDCs) in all Fire District apparatus. As a result of this process the first generation electronic maps were deployed for use. Additionally, since early 2008, Clearcreek Fire District has partnered with Mr. Don Sebastianelli, Warren County Telecommunications Applications Analyst, in using his expertise of utilizing the Global Information System (GIS) mapping data that is used by the Warren County Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system to produce our Response Zone Maps. As a result of partnering with Warren County Telecommunications, the Fire District has deployed these new style Response Zone Maps using the same map information as the Warren County CAD system to our Mobile Data Computer (MDC) fleet. These new portable document (map) files (PDF), for each

of our response zones continue to represent a significant improvement over our previous ones.

During 2011, the Clearcreek Fire District continued work with Warren County Telecommunications to continue to improve and refine the electronic maps. As a result of these ongoing efforts a Warren County Grid Mapping System is now in use county wide. These new maps include a hot linked overview grid index map that is common to all MDCs county wide enhancing emergency response interoperability capabilities county wide between all public safety agencies.

We are now fully utilizing this system to acquire our future periodic map updates.

Collectively the efforts of leveraging the existing and regularly updated CAD GIS map data has played a vital role in reducing the time spent on upgrading our Response Zone Maps (we no longer have to draw them and no additional costs are incurred other than optionally printing them), thus increasing the efficiency of Clearcreek Fire District operations.

Additionally, we are also now able to utilize this technology to plot geographical incident response data and trending to maps for Fire District future planning purposes.

Radio System / UHF & VHF Narrow Banding / 800 MHz Digital Migration

During 1995 the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), mandated that radio systems must begin operating in a narrow band configuration no later than January 1, 2013. Simply put, narrow banding requires VHF and UHF radios to use less radio bandwidth (i.e., spectrum), thus leaving the vacated spectrum available to form new channels. Narrow banding ensures more efficient use of the spectrum and greater spectrum access for public safety and non-public safety users. Narrow banding may relieve channel congestion and result in increased channel availability. Currently, there is often not enough spectrum available for licensees to expand their existing systems or implement new systems. With the Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) January 1, 2013 narrow banding mandate deadline approaching, agencies will be devoting significant resources to planning for and executing a coordinated transition.

Warren County Telecommunications implemented their narrow banding transition plan on November 15, 2011. This directly effected our primary UHF radio incident paging and alerting systems and outdoor warning siren activation systems.

During 2011, Clearcreek Fire District completed the following in preparation for the required narrow banding:

- Upgraded and programmed our Fire Station Alerting Systems to narrow band compliant.
- Partnered with Warren County Telecommunication to replace and reprogram our UHF Minitor Pager fleet (30), to the narrow band capable Motorola Minitor V model for emergency incident paging.

- Replaced all non compliant VHF radios with a narrow band capable radio models.
- Contracted with Federal Field Services to upgrade the current outdoor warning sirens radio receivers on each warning siren that is responsible for processing the activation signal. Completion of this project is anticipated in early 2012.

During 2012 the Fire District will be performing a coordinated programming switch over to narrow band on all of our VHF radios, as well as, making a required FCC Radio License modification for our licensed 153.890 VHF frequency in order to meet narrow band licensing compliance.

The 800 MHz Trunked Radio technology is also rapidly changing with a requirement for radios to be migrated to digital capability in the coming years. The Warren County 800 MHz System is presently an analogue system but will be replaced by a new digital system during late 2012.

In preparation for this change, during 2011 Warren County Telecommunications replaced all of the Warren County owned a Motorola MCS 2000 and MTS 2000 radios that were originally issued to the Clearcreek Fire District, with the new Motorola XTL 2500 and XTS 2500 models which are digital capable. The aforementioned radios represent an investment of over \$216,162.80 by Warren County Telecommunications in providing public safety radio equipment to the Clearcreek Fire District. The Fire District was required to replace two (2), early model Motorola MTS 2000 portable radios that were purchased by the Clearcreek Fire District during 1995 at a total cost of \$6,579.20.

As a result of the aforementioned efforts, all of our existing 800 MHz radios are now digital upgrade capable to work on the new forthcoming Warren County 800 MHZ digital radio system.

Rural Address Locator Sign Program

The Clearcreek Fire District initiated the Rural Address Locator (RAL), Sign program in July of 1993. The purpose of this program was to provide, at cost, a 6" x 18" reflective sign that would clearly display street addresses with three inch 3M scotchlite adhesive backed numbers. These signs are made available to residents of the Township and community who request them for a \$10.00 charge. For residents of the Clearcreek Fire District's response jurisdiction the price includes installation of the sign. Similar signs are sold commercially for approximately \$45.00 each and this does not even include installation.

These signs have been invaluable to District Fire / EMS crews as well as, police officers who have been looking for an address at the time of an emergency. Prior to the inception of this program, we were frequently being hindered in delivering emergency services to many of our Township residents, due to the simple fact that we often could not easily find their address; this program has been a huge success.

Since the inception of the program, the Fire District has produced over 1628 of these signs. During 2011, the Fire District installed a total of 5 new signs. During 2011 the Fire District purchased \$23.23 of 3" reflective lettering. Previously, the last major purchases for RAL sign materials occurred during 2009 and totaled \$361.62.

Inventory Control

The inventory system is the method by which Clearcreek Fire District tracks its physical assets in the form of non-consumable or non-disposable items and equipment. The goal is to ensure that assets are tracked and accounted for in an efficient manner. This serves for both public accountability and for insurance documentation purposes in case of unanticipated loss, damage, or theft. Presently, there are over 2,486 different items entered into the Clearcreek Fire Districts' Inventory. Items are removed from inventory when they either become no longer, serviceable, damaged, broken, obsolete by age, or procedural need. Unserviceable, damaged, or broken items are subsequently disposed of through waste collection. Obsolete items are set aside and are assigned as an auction item. Auction items are periodically sold through Clearcreek Township's participation in the annual Warren County auction process or govdeals.com auction website

The Annual Inventory Process for the Clearcreek Fire District involves verifying the CCFD inventory tag numbers to the actual numbers on the item. Discrepancies are noted and corrected as needed. Additionally, any new items, not already listed in the inventory are also added. The completed inventory is assembled in November and submitted in December of each year to the Fire Chief.

Station Supplies

The Clearcreek Fire District utilizes a quartermaster type system for supply management. Supply management is the acquisition, storage, and physical distribution of consumable or disposable supplies utilized by the Fire District. The goals of the supply management program are to ensure that all consumable or disposable goods and materials are properly received, stored, and physically distributed. Additionally, maintaining a stock of materials in a central location and in sufficient quantity is a sound business practice and provides security and ease of inventory control; central warehousing allows for the purchase of goods in economic quantities.

During 2011, the Clearcreek Fire District spent a total of \$9,747.33 on consumable or disposable supplies. Of this total \$5,336.25 was spent on various general cleaning supplies from Zep Manufacturing. Another \$4,411.08 was spent on other miscellaneous supplies that were obtained from the Sam's Club Collective as a part of the Clearcreek Township joint purchasing effort. Total station supply costs have remained consistent during the past two years averaging just over \$9,425.00.

Facility Maintenance

Facilities maintenance involves the preventative maintenance of assets in the form of buildings, grounds, equipment, and systems. The intended goal is to ensure that those assets are maintained and operating in an efficient manner and that they remain a valued resource. Neglect will dramatically reduce the life of the assets as well as compromise the safety of the operations. Proper facilities maintenance will reduce the

down time of equipment and facilities as well as reducing the need for premature replacement. Our facility maintenance program helps us in maintaining our Fire Safety, OSHA Compliance, and BWC Risk reduction requirements to help us insure that we are maintaining a safe work environment for our employees. During 2011, the Clearcreek Fire District continued efforts at being proactive in the area of facility maintenance. Some major items repaired and replaced during 2011 at Fire Station 21 included a complete replacement of the HVAC system, a complete roof replacement, an upgrade of the existing lightning protection system, and seal coating and striping the Station #21 exterior asphalt and concrete areas. Upcoming significant projects for the Fire District stations during 2012 include in part replacement of some Fire Station 21 apparatus bay doors, addition of lightning protection to Fire Stations 22 and 23, and connection of Fire Station 22 to the municipal sanitary system.

Over all facility maintenance costs were up \$117,783.85 during 2011over 2010. It was anticipated that 2011 costs would be significantly higher due to the projected costs of the planned projects

2011 Payroll Hours & Sick Leave Hours Usage

During 2011, Clearcreek Fire District part-time employees worked a combined total of 54,064.69 hours, career employees worked a combined total 97,474 regular work hours, and career personnel worked a combined total of 1371.5 overtime work hours. There was a reduction of overtime usage by 1,113.5 hours during 2011 over 2010. Overtime usage over the past three years has shown a consistent downward trend. During 2009 career personnel worked a combined total of 3709.75 overtime work hours; during 2010 this was reduced to 2,485 hours, and even lower during 2011 at 1371.5 hours. This is a reduction of total overtime hours of 2,338.25 hours since 2009.

During 2011, Clearcreek Fire District career employees utilized a combined total of 1706.25 sick leave hours. Administrative Staff Officers utilized a total of 8 hours of sick leave. Captains / Lieutenants utilized 609.75 and Career Firefighter / Paramedics utilized a total of 1,088.5 sick leave hours. There was an increase of sick leave usage by a total of 368.25 hours during 2011 over 2010. This is attributable to an increased number of total career personnel and one individual who used 255.5 hours of sick leave due to an illness.

HIPPA Privacy Officer

The Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) of 1996 (Code of Federal Regulations, 2002, also referred to as Public Law 104-191 or the Kennedy-Kassebaum Act) which contains many provisions in which most ambulance services in the United States must comply. The most challenging aspects of HIPPA include the Privacy Rule. As a part of our compliance program during 2007, Career Fire District Personnel were issued RSA SecurID® Tokens through Warren Telecommunications for accessing our Fire / EMS Records Management Systems (FireRMS). RSA SecurID® is a two-factor authentication based on something you know (password), and something you physically have (an authenticator token key), thus providing a much more reliable and higher level of user authentication than reusable passwords alone. Implementation of changes such as the RSA SecurID® Tokens is an example of the Fire District's ongoing efforts and commitment to be HIPPA compliant. As a result of maintaining our ongoing compliance The Fire District was required to purchase replacement RSA SecurID® Tokens during 2011 at \$75.00 each, for a total cost of \$3,300.00. The new tokens will be good for another three years and will not require replacement again until May 2015.

Because the various HIPPA regulations have been published and implemented at different times over the past several years, HIPPA has been a dynamic issue, requiring ambulance services to monitor the newest standards, regulations, and interpretations, to assure and maintain compliance. The Deputy Chief acts as the Fire District H. I. P. P. A. Privacy Officer. The Privacy Officer oversees all ongoing activities related to the development, implementation, maintenance of the organization's policies and procedures covered within the HIPPA regulations, compliance with federal and state laws, and the healthcare organization's information privacy practices.

The Clearcreek Fire District is required by law to maintain the privacy of certain confidential health care information, known as Protected Health Information or PHI, and to provide information concerning our Notice of Privacy Practices to all patients we serve. The procedure to provide our Notice of Privacy Practices involves the mailing of a brochure to each patient that the Clearcreek Fire District had contact with within a week of the service date. During 2011, Clearcreek Fire District mailed 1,978 notices of Clearcreek Fire District Privacy Practices. The approximate costs of this include:

SAS 70 Compliance Officer

During June 1994, the Clearcreek Fire District implemented EMS Billing program. As a result of finding number 1999-404483-001 in Clearcreek Township Warren County

Regular Audit For The Years Ended December 31, 2001-2000, the Township was required to acquire a Statement of Auditing Standards (SAS) number 70 Report. The SAS 70 Report addresses Controls in Operation and Tests of Effectiveness of the Emergency Medical Service Claims Processing and Payment Posting System from the billing agency. The SAS Number 70 report is an auditing standard developed by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and its purpose is to enable an auditor to evaluate and issue an opinion on the controls a service organization has in place. Additionally, finding number 1999-404483-001 found that "Township has not established procedures to reasonably determine that ambulance billings have been completely and accurately processed in accordance with the ambulance billing contract." As a result of this finding the Clearcreek Fire District was directed by the Clearcreek Township Administration to develop an EMS billing compliance and operations policy manual to address these and other EMS billing issues. This was completed during 2003 utilizing assistance from HealthServe and information obtained from The Office of the Inspector General of the Department of Health and Human Services (OIG), Compliance Program Guidance for Ambulance Suppliers, (CPG), (Fed. Reg. 2003).


The compliance program is a series of policies that are designed to detect and prevent fraudulent and abusive billing practices as well as other illegal practices not related to billing. It is also designed to detect on-going errors made by the company. The government has made it clear that entities that implement a voluntary compliance program will receive favorable treatment if the company is alleged to have over-billed Medicare.

Significant changes in Medicare/Medicaid rules and regulations were promulgated by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) on 11/29/2010. These changes pertain to the documentation of fractional mileage on Ambulance / EMS Reports. As a result all Ambulance / EMS reports with dates of service on and after January 1, 2011, the CMS states that ambulance services will be required to report mileage to the nearest tenth of a mile. The policy will apply to all claims with mileage up to 100 loaded miles. This equates to all of Clearcreek Fire District EMS transports.


Additionally, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Service (CMS), during 2010 issued new guidance concerning the processing of Medicare/Medicaid EMS Billing Claims. To summarize, CMS has directed their claim processing contractors to disregard any medical documentation in which signatures and credentials cannot be verified or are missing. This means that a Patient Care Record / EMS Report may not count in an audit, appeal, or review if the signatures cannot be easily verified. This may result in claim denials or money already paid being recouped later during an appeal or audit process. In order to be proactive in protecting our EMS Billing funding, during 2011 we began capturing signature specimens of all Fire District EMS Personnel in the form of a signature log. We will be doing this new procedure at least annually, but this may be modified based upon any future guidance issued.


The compliance program identifies Compliance / Privacy Officer who will define, implement, monitor and enforce our Compliance Program. The Clearcreek Fire District Compliance / Privacy Officer is the Deputy Chief. Due to the soft billing approach, this entire process takes approximately 90 to 180 days after the end of a quarter to complete. In some cases this takes even longer if partial payments are being made. Each audited patient transport account balance must be zeroed either through payment or write off before the random audit can be closed. No errors were found in any of the random quarterly selections during 2011.

CAD Incidents Dispatched by Political Subdivision 2011







Fourteen Year "Request for Service" Trend

2011 FIRE / EMS MUTUAL AID REQUESTS EMS RECEIVED EMS FIRE RECEIVED FIRE GIVEN







This graph represents the parameter of response based on the MMA Strategic Analysis and Master Plan. Dispatch and turn-out time are not included.

SIGNIFICANT FIRE EMERGENCIES – 2011

January

- On 1/9/2011 @ 11:30 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 9991 Williams Drive, Franklin for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival crews were assigned to function as the Rapid Intervention Crew. Crews functioned in this capacity as well as performing exterior fire suppression operations.
- On 1/23/2011 @ 20:11 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 5945 North State Route 48 for a reported chimney fire. Upon arrival crews they the fire in the firebox had been extinguished by the resident. Our crews removed the burnt wood from the firebox and checked the chimney and attic space for fire extension. There was no hazard found.

February

 On 2/24/2011 @ 01:48 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded mutual aid to 216 North Mechanic Street in the City of Lebanon for a structure fire. Upon arrival crews found a single family historical home with heavy fire and smoke showing. Crews assisted with suppression, ventilation and overhaul duties. Two of our investigators also responded to assist with the fire investigation.\$15,000.00. Mutual aid assistance was received from the City of Franklin Fire Department.

March

On 3/4/2011 @ 11:51 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 1545 West Pekin Road for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival crews found a fire in an upstairs bedroom partially extinguished by the homeowner. The remaining fire was quickly extinguished. Damage was estimated at \$5,000.00. Mutual aid was received from Turtlecreek Township Fire Department.

- On 3/7/2011 @ 05:34 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 5436 Weidner Road for a reported electrical fire. Upon arrival crews found smoke in the attic. Our crew's located an electrical line which ignited insulation and roof joists in the attic. Damage was estimated at \$5,000.00
- On 3/20/2011 @ 15:50 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 125 Bayberry Drive for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival crews found a exterior wall on fire where the majority of the fire was extinguished by the homeowner. Damage was estimated at \$5,000.00. Mutual aid was received from the City of Franklin Fire Department.
- On 3/21/2011 @ 17:29 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 580 East State Route 73 for a brush fire. Upon arrival crews found a large field on fire approximately 1500' off the roadway. Crews brought the fire under control within 20 minutes. Mutual Aid was received from the Wayne Township Fire Department.
- On 3/27/2011 @ 02:19 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to the area
 of State Route 48 and Lytle 5 Points for a reported vehicle fire. Upon arrival
 crews found a full size SUV fully involved in fire. Our crews extinguished the fire
 and determined the cause to be arson. CCPD is conducting the investigation.
- On 3/30/2011 @ 18:44 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 5267 North State Route 48 for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival crews found a large detached garage heavily involved in fire. Crews worked to extinguish the fire where they encountered two large explosions. The fire extended into the residence but was quickly brought under control. Damage was estimated at \$70,000.00. Mutual aid was received by Franklin Township and Turtlecreek Township Fire Departments.

April

- On 4/1/2011 @ 16:31 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 19 East 5th Street in the City of Franklin for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival crews assisted with suppression efforts.
- On 4/11/2011 @ 16:42 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 9055 Yankee Road (B & J Yankee Stables) for a reported structure fire. Upon arrival crews found light haze of smoke in the structure. The haze was traced down to a faulty furnace Our crews were able to isolate the problem with little to no property damage. We assisted the homeowner by removing the smoke. Mutual aid was received by the City of Franklin.
- On 4/23/2011 @ 19:39 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to creek in the area of Clearcreek park for a reported water rescue. Upon arrival crews

found a kayaker stranded on an island in the middle of Clearcreek. The kayaker was uninjured but needed rescued due to the high waters. Our crews assisted the City of Franklin, Miami Township and the City of Miamisburg who performed a boat rescue of the victim.

- On 4/24/2011 @ 15:48 hrs., CCFD Fire and EMS crews responded to 240 West Central Avenue for a reported hazardous material situation. Our crews filled the dumpster with water and contacted the dumpster company for clean up.





- On 1/27/11 Captain Lantman attended a training presentation hosted by the Monroe Fire Department on emergency response to facilities with Solar Arrays.


February

- Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG) program. FP&S Grants support projects that enhance the safety of the public and firefighters from fire and related hazards. The primary goal is to target high-risk populations and reduce injury and prevent death.
- On 2/2/11 the Fire District was awarded a \$92,570.00 grant from the federal Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG) program. The Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG) program is a component in the Department of Homeland Security's effort to strengthen the general level of preparedness and capacity to respond to fire and related dangers. AFG awards grants to fire departments and EMS organizations in an effort to enhance their ability to protect the health and safety of the public. The Clearcreek Fire District's grant award is to fund the purchase of 10 exhaust mounted air filtration systems and 4 MASIMO Rad-57 Carboxyhemeglobin meters used for noninvasive monitoring of blood Carbon Monoxide levels in firefighters and EMS patients.
- Chief Kidd attended the annual Ohio Public Employer Labor Relations Association's (OHPELRA), Conference in Newark, Ohio from 2/6/11 through 2/8/11.
- During the Ice Storm occurring 2/1/11 through 2/3/11 the Fire District used this weather event as an opportunity to practice implementation of the National Incident Management System (NIMS). During the event the Fire District Practiced live documentation of daily 12 hour operational periods tracking incidents, equipment assets, and personnel resources. This provided an real world practice scenario and produced useable documentation for use in the event of an actual disaster declaration.

March

- On 3/11/11, the Clearcreek Fire District was awarded \$1,785,176.00 for hiring of personnel under the Homeland Security (DHS) Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant Program. The recruitment and hiring period is 90 days from the date the grant is approved with the grants specified two year performance period commencing on 6/5/11 through 6/4/13. Under the provisions of the grant the Fire District is presently posting for 12 Career Firefighter / Paramedic positions and one Lieutenant position. The formal selection / hiring process steps will commence during April. This grant award represents the largest grant award the Fire District has ever received to date.

Various portions of the selection process included application / resume review, written testing, physical agility testing, assessment testing, multiple oral interviews, drug testing, back ground investigations, pre-employment psychological and polygraph testing. Recommendations for offers to hire for the successful applicants will be forth coming during early May 2011.

Fire and EMS Training:

The Fire District understands the value of training and education toward optimum performance and service delivery. The Training and Safety Services of the Clearcreek Fire District strives to do the following:

- To teach new employees what they need to know in order to function well on the job;
- To keep skills current for all fire and EMS personnel;
- · To introduce new ideas, techniques, skills and equipment to all personnel; and
- To maintain and improve the function of individual crews, or groups of crews working together, and of department personnel working with personnel from other agencies.

Good fire training creates a positive environment for new employees, improves the skills of current firefighters, and leads the fire district safely and progressively into the future. Poor fire training (or none at all) threatens the safety of all firefighters, reduces morale, and violates the department's prime directive to provide the best possible protection for the community it serves.

In 2011, the Training Division continued to excel in continuing the training goals developed in 2007. Within this program, crews completed drills each month that was congruent with the Insurance Service Organization (ISO) for maintaining a minimum amount of training for each member. The objectives to be met each month followed subjects in the following areas:

- Self Contained Breathing Apparatus Drills
- Engine Company Drills
- Ladder Company Drills
- Rescue Company Drills
- Rapid Intervention Drills

- Ventilation Drills
- Water Supply Drills
- Hazardous Materials Drills
- District Familiarization Activities
- National Fire Academy Coffee Break training programs

These drills provide the basic skills needed to maintain a high level of scene competency among the crews.

Each Shift Training Program was between one and two hours in length and established a level of expectation among all operation personnel. Each training evolution had clear objectives and goals for the members to follow.

We also had several mandatory courses during 2011. These included drivers training, Fire Apparatus Operator recertification, Aerial Tower Operator recertification, CPR, Miami Valley EMS Council Standing Orders and Bureau of Workers Compensation Drug and Alcohol Training.

Crews received training in the intricacies of electric vehicles. David Stover of Sinclair Community College presented six classes on Hybrid vehicles and how auto extrication affects the vehicles. This was done with a grant through the college.

The Training and Safety Services implemented four hours of EMS training each month. These trainings were based around the Miami Valley EMS Council's standing orders and the National Registry recertification guidelines for Paramedic providers. All members took a written test March of 2011 to document the knowledge of the MVEMSC Standing Orders and we had 100% pass rate. Skill sets were demonstrated and all members completed an EMS Skill Competency February of 2010. Topics for 2010 included Advanced Airway, Mega Code and Patient Assessment, splinting, IV techniques and Head Trauma. Other mandatory topics included CPR recertification, 12 Lead review, GMVEMSC Standing Orders testing and Bloodborne Pathogens.

We had several guest speakers that presented unique topics such the Mobile Education Lab (MEL) from Miami Valley Hospital, Advanced Cardiac Life Support and Paramedic Refresher classes from Sinclair Community College.

EMTs and Paramedics were also in-serviced by the Boundtree Representative for the new C-PAP devices that we started carrying on the medic units.

Individual training programs are designed to further educate the employee at their pace and give new opportunities to advance in the organization. Upon completion of each training program, the employee is given a qualification certificate to identify their new areas of responsibility. Examples of these trainings include: objectives check-off; driver's safety class; medic driving; Fire Apparatus Operator; and Aerial Tower Operator programs.

During 2011, we certified 16 new Fire Apparatus Operators and 8 new Aerial Operators. We also had 10 individuals complete paramedic school and were certified as paramedics.

In 2011 we hired 12 individuals for positions as full-time firefighter/paramedics and 1 individual as a Lieutenant. This was made possible through the SAFER Grant from the Federal Government. All 13 individuals completed a four week Clearcreek Fire District Academy developed and delivered by the Training division. During the 4 weeks, the individuals were in the classroom and drill areas. They performed tasks associated with orientation that included basic fire and EMS related items. The new recruits also completed a week long Fire Apparatus Operator class. Recruits that were not Fire Safety Inspectors were given an in-house Fire Safety Inspector class during the academy. All new personnel graduated the academy and were placed in stations in July 2011. When they graduated, all new personnel completed their orientation period, completed Fire Safety Inspector training and were certified as Fire Apparatus Operators on the department.

We also hired one part-time firefighter/EMT in 2011. This individual was sent through the orientation process that was developed in 2008. This process allows the new hire to better understand the procedures of the Clearcreek Fire District and enables them to become more efficient in the operations of the department. This was a three phase process outlined below.

- Phase one: This is a two day group orientation where the probationary firefighter sits through administration orientation. During this time the firefighter gets oriented to the department, completes all paperwork, is fit tested for proper SCBA fit and meets the administrative staff. They also attend their 4 hour Driver Safety class. There is minimal operational information conveyed. The firefighters are given their shift assignment and after the two days, they move to phase two.
- Phase two: This phase lasts about 3-4 weeks. The firefighter spends day one with their Battalion Captain. During this day they learn the shift, meet the other firefighters on the shift and learn the expectations of their Captain. After day one, they report to Station 23 for the remainder of Phase two. At Station 23 they are able to get individualized attention to complete a task packet that included such objectives as hose operations, forcible entry, ventilation operations and other basic engine activities that they would be responsible for on the fire ground. They also get better one-on-one training with the ambulance. Since they have their initial driver course completed, they are able to drive the Medic unit on routine details and area familiarization. Once the Station 23 Lieutenant fells the firefighter has completed the objectives, they sign the Phase two completion and the firefighter is transferred to Station 21.
- Phase three: This phase also lasts about 3-4 weeks. During this time, the Shift Captain assigns the firefighter to a career member for shadowing. During this time, the firefighter shadows the career member, learning the job. The career member works with the firefighter to assist them in learning the job so that the

firefighter is prepared to complete orientation. Once the career firefighter and the Shift Captain determine that the firefighter is able to perform functions on the fire and EMS scene, then the Captain signs the Phase three form and returns it the Captain of Training and Life Safety. At this point the firefighter is released to complete probation as a member of the crew. Prior to this, the firefighter could not be considered as a counting member for minimum manning purposes.

During 2011, several employees also attended various programs outside the Fire District. These include classes at both the National Fire Academy and the Ohio Fire Academy. We also had members attend specialized trainings that include Auto Extrication, Fire Department Instructors Conference in Indianapolis, IN, International Fire Chiefs Conference in Atlanta, GA, Fire Rescue Med Conference in Las Vegas, the Ohio Safety Congress in Columbus, OH and other various leadership classes and conferences throughout the region.

Chief Bob Kidd completed his required classes for the Executive Fire Officer course at the National Fire Academy. Lieutenant Dan Swords started Ohio Fire Executive courses in 2011.

Clearcreek Fire District also received a grant from the Ohio Public Utilities Commission of Ohio. (PUCO) This grant allowed the Clearcreek Fire District to send three Officers to the Williams Fire and Hazard Control School held in Beaumont, Texas. This is a specialty school that focuses on industrial firefighting and fuel farm mitigation. The grant paid for the tuition of \$1695.00 per person.

With the help of Fire District Clerk Nancy Randolph and Assistant Clerk Susie Romans, recording and documenting the training hours has become easier with the addition of the electronic training database designed in 2010

Approximately 9481 firefighter hours have been used to educate and prepare our employees to serve the community during the year 2011. On average, each Firefighter completed 9.5 hours of training per month. Through these training programs we feel that we continue to follow and accomplish our four goals, by creating a positive environment for new employees, improving the skills of current firefighters, and leading a fire district safely and progressively into the future.

In 2011, the Continuing Education Certificate by the State of Ohio Department of Public Safety for the Clearcreek Fire District was due for renewal. In February 2011, the State of Ohio held an audit of the EMS Training program. The Clearcreek Fire District received the renewal and there were no deficiencies found. The certificate was renewed until 2014.



EMS Quality Assurance / Improvement Program:

In June, Troy Bonfield was hired to be the new EMS Lieutenant. Reviewing the QA/QI program was one of the programs that the EMS Lieutenant would be in charge of reviewing and recommending changes on. A new revised policy and QA/QI program was implemented the first of October.

The role of the Quality Assurance/Quality Improvement program is to evaluate the quality of care provided to the patients requesting Emergency Medical Services. The standard of care set forth by the Ohio State Board of EMS and GMVEMSC is the foundation for this program.

As a continuous review of quality control activities, Quality Assurance provides essential feedback to the personnel involved. This feedback can have a great impact on response safety, patient care and transport, patient transfers and documentation of all data to ensure a seamless account of the Emergency Medical Services event from start to finish.

Monthly audit material will follow the current GMVEMSC guidelines.

Operational criteria will consist of information from the following documents:

- 1. Fire department policies/procedures and guidelines
- 2. State of Ohio Board of EMS Scope of Practice
- 3. Regional EMS Protocols

In addition to runs that meet audit criteria a total of 10% of the monthly run total will randomly be pulled for audit.

The Fire Department EMS Lieutenant will be responsible for daily review of all patient care records. He will then forward the PCR's number that meets the audit criteria on to the appropriate platoon committee member. The committee member will then be responsible to complete the Audit Response Form for each run. Each platoon committee member will pull runs from the previous platoon day. (See Figure 5-1) The platoon committee member will also be responsible for randomly pulling runs to meet 10% of the monthly total.

Accident / Incident Investigation:

Accident / Incident Investigations are used to determine the sequences of events leading to an accident which may or may not cause injury or damage. It identifies the primary cause of the accident / incident and finds methods to prevent accident from recurring.

Ideally the investigation of both accidents and incidents should be undertaken as a scientific research project, designed to extract the greatest amount of knowledge from

the experience and to disseminate that knowledge so that no one needs to have such an experience again.

Information gathered during these investigations is to determine the need for training personnel. These trainings may be conducted as remediation for the individuals involved, or it may be used during shift trainings. In either instance it is the primary goal is to use the information to prevent any similar accidents / incidents.

Shift Commanders were trained in 2009 to conduct investigations for minor incidents and provide the Captain of Training and Life Safety Services a report of such incidents. In 2011, the Shift Commanders and Station Lieutenants did the majority of the accident investigations.

Safety Services:

In an effort to reduce our contribution to Ohio BWC, the Fire District has taken steps to operate under the OSHA standards voluntarily. The Clearcreek Fire District participates in the Warren County Safety Council and assists this organization with educational programs throughout the year. We have had OSHA Inspections and corrected and followed the recommendations made by OSHA Inspectors. The Fire District operates under the 10-step plan outlined by Ohio BWC. We are a Transitional WorkGrant company. This is a transitional work program that BWC developed that is designed to obtain the maximum level of production from the employee while the employee rehabilitates to return to full duty. Policies for these programs are currently in place and luckily we have not had to utilize these services. Realizing that by design, the nature of the work is dangerous, by all employees participating in these programs, we can make the workplace as safe as possible and reduce the risk of injuries.

In 2010, Clearcreek Township and the Clearcreek Fire District was able to secure a grant through the Ohio Bureau of Workers Compensation for \$18,487.69. This money was used to upgrade emergency lighting on Fire District, Police and Service Department vehicles. It also provided money to add new safety striping to the rear of Service Department dump trucks, Fire District Response vehicles and Police department cars. This brought the Fire District Response vehicle up to NFPA standards for rear vehicle reflective striping. During 2011, several reports were submitted and a large data collection report was compiled by Captain Lantman and submitted to the Ohio BWC to assist the BWC in prevention benchmarks in the workplace.

Physical Agility Coordinator:

This test is designed to measure the essential, job-related physical abilities required of a Firefighter / Emergency Medical Service Provider. The test is limited to those aspects of the job that do not require specific training or techniques, which may require additional training.

The Physical Agility test was reviewed by several administrative personnel and officers of the department. It was determined that the skills that were on the original test needed to be updated. Captain of Training and several shift officers reviewed several options and came up with a three part agility test that looked at several fire ground skills. The test was given to the three shift captains and all personnel ran through the test. Participants were timed and we came up with an appropriate time for candidates.

The purpose of the physical agility test is to evaluate perspective employees' ability to perform the essential functions of the job of a Fire Fighter / Emergency Medical Services personnel with the Clearcreek Fire District. Components of the test include various fire ground skills that the firefighter will face at any given time.

The participants, that have passed, have demonstrated that they are physically capable of accomplishing the basic tasks on the fire ground. This gives the Clearcreek Fire District a base line to determine the applicants' physical ability to do the job. Physically fit employees are less likely to be injured and can work better as a part of a team. These attributes benefit the Clearcreek Fire District by ensuring that perspective employees are physically prepared to do the job.

The Fire District performed two physical agility tests for part time personnel. One test was performed in January in which one firefighter/EMT was hired. The second part time agility test was performed in November with the process ongoing into 2012.

The Fire District also held two agility tests for the career positions in April and one agility test for career lieutenant position in April. From these, 12 career firefighter/paramedic and one lieutenant position was filled.

Fire and Life Safety Inspections

The Fire and Life Safety Inspection program is focused on partnering with business owners to ensure the safety of their employees, customers, and property. Inspectors visit each business within the response district on an annual basis. Small and medium sized businesses are the lifeblood of the community, and statistics show that four out of five never reopen after a fire. Inspectors work with building owners to identify hazards and abate them before they cause a fire.

Prior to the inspection, the business owner is mailed an informational pamphlet titled "Preparing for Your Fire and Life Safety Inspection". This pamphlet is meant to educate the business owner about the most common hazards our inspectors identify. Many business owners have responded positively to this information, taking time to eliminate common hazards prior to the inspection. This also assists in making the inspection program more efficient by eliminating return trips to a business to ensure violations are corrected.

At the end of each inspection, the business owner is provided with a written report and a comment card. In 2011, 68 response cards were returned by mail. The comment card has five categories to rate, with the average respondent for 2011 rating the inspection process at 18.2 out of 20.0. In addition, several business owners made positive comments about their inspections:

"They were all very professional and friendly. Answered all questions completely."

"They were nice and very professional."

The inspectors were "both pleasantly personable and were a positive representation of the department"

"Thank you for providing this valued and professional service."

Clearcreek Fire District inspectors completed a total of 710 annual Fire and Life Safety inspections during 2011, a slight increase over 2010 numbers. Career Firefighter / Paramedics that are cross trained as Fire Safety Inspectors are utilized to inspect business offices and smaller retail stores. The Lieutenant and Firefighter assigned to prevention performs the annual inspection on all places of assembly, factories, and businesses dealing with hazardous substances. In addition, inspections are provided for every building licensed by the Ohio Department of Education and the Ohio Department of Job and Family Services within our response district. These include day care facilities, preschools, and all buildings operated by the Springboro City Community School District.

Any family wishing to foster or adopt a child must undergo a fire safety inspection in their home. These inspections help identify and eliminate common fire hazards in the home and also ensure that there is a plan for children to escape if there is a fire. During 2011, 28 of these inspections were completed for residents of the community.

Several trainings were conducted for the fire inspectors during the year. Training topics included a review of fire sprinkler systems, kitchen fire suppression systems, standpipe operations, and the upcoming revisions to the Ohio Fire Code.

Pre-Incident Plans

Pre-Incident Plans (Preplans) contain preformatted information designed to be at the fingertips of company and command officers during an emergency incident. Preplans contain the necessary information to allow the fire officer to make safe and effective tactical decisions upon arrival at an emergency. The preplan contains data concerning business name, response zone, occupancy use, times occupied, Knox Box location, hazards, fire behavior prediction, problems and concerns, building description, roof construction, floor construction, locations of fire protection systems, primary water supply information and required water flow at various levels of fire involvement.

A diagram of the structure is provided to allow crews to anticipate the interior layout of the building prior to performing search and rescue operations. It also allows firefighters to locate the various utility shut-offs or hazards within the structure. Photographs taken from each side of the structure are also included, giving command officers managing a night-time incident the advantage of seeing the structure during the daylight hours.

During 2011, 86 new preplans were completed and 261 existing preplans were updated and placed on the fire district's mobile data computers.

While preplans are an invaluable tool on the scene of a fire, they also play a role in the training of fire district crews. Firefighters have access to each preplan on the district's computer network, allowing them to review any preplan to familiarize themselves with a particular business within our community. Preplans are often integrated into tactical

training, where fire companies envision an emergency scenario and move through the response process in order to sharpen decision making skills.

Public Education Activities

The annual Springboro Business Expo was attended by the Clearcreek Fire District on Saturday, March 19, 2011. The event is an opportunity for the fire district to explain our purpose and mission to the local community. Firefighters were on hand all day distributing fire and life safety brochures and answering questions. Sparky the Fire Dog was also in attendance, drawing children and their parents to learn more about the Clearcreek Fire District. Children were invited to try their hand at a game of corn toss, where they throw "water" beanbags through "flaming" windows. Special programs were also featured, including blood pressure checks and the Rural Address Locator signs.

On August 2, 2011 the Clearcreek Fire District supported the Clearcreek Police Department's efforts on "National Night Out". This annual event was held at Patricia Allyn Park and focused on bringing the community together for crime prevention and to learn more about their township services. Firefighters were on hand to give tours of the apparatus, answer questions, and provide fire safety information. Firefighters also held a mock auto extrication where a simulated patient was cut out of a crashed vehicle.

During fire prevention month in October, fire district personnel remained busy attending a number of events centered on the 2011 theme of "Protect Your Family From Fire". The firefighters spoke about the importance of eliminating common fire hazards from the home. Safety presentations were made to each and every kindergarten and first grade student in the Springboro City Community School District. Brochures with age appropriate fire safety tips were distributed to everyone in attendance along with a magnet that featured the theme. The sessions concluded with a demonstration of a firefighter dressing in their personal protective equipment. This brief activity shows children that a firefighter may look strange when all geared up, but they are there to protect and help the child. The children are then encouraged to talk to the firefighter to hear how breathing apparatus changes the sound of their voice.

Residents of our community often request the fire department to have a presence at many different types of events. These include preschool and daycare visits, community festivals, block parties, and birthday parties. Civic organizations such as the boy scouts and girl scouts are also welcome to visit the fire stations and apparatus with prior notice. These visits generally include a tour of the facility as well as several of the apparatus. For daycare or preschool visits, crews bring an in-service fire engine to the facility to talk with the children. Classes are brought together for a fire safety presentation, and then all children are given the opportunity to tour the fire engine and climb up inside the cab. This is a big event for the children, with many recalling stories of how much fun they had the previous year. During 2011, fire district personnel attended 51 of these events.



New Construction Plans Review and Acceptance Testing

The Clearcreek Fire District works diligently to ensure that new buildings constructed within the response district are built in accordance with the governing codes, including the Ohio Fire Code. Partnerships have been established with the local building, zoning, and planning commission officials to coordinate efforts when it comes to reviewing and testing fire and life safety equipment. The issues addressed through this process have a direct and positive effect on our ability to manage an emergency.

Lieutenant Vecchi and Firefighter Carman witnessed a total of 58 acceptance tests with the City of Springboro Building Department and the Warren County Building Department in 2011.

Knox Rapid Entry System

The Clearcreek Fire District utilizes the "Knox Rapid Entry System" to ensure that in an emergency access can be gained to a building in a non-destructive manner. These lock boxes are secured with a master key only accessible to fire district personnel. These keys remained locked in the apparatus until requested and remotely unlocked by a dispatcher at the Warren County Communications Center. This process occurs over the primary fire dispatch radio channel, providing great security against unauthorized use.

During 2011, the fire district placed a total of 16 new boxes in service, bringing the total installations across the district to 238.

Defective Appliance Tag Out System

The Clearcreek Fire District often responds to situations where a minor fire has occurred or a hazard exists due to a defective appliance. In this instance, the officer of the responding apparatus places a tag on the affected item with specific information about the response and actions taken by fire department personnel. The resident is advised not to use the defective appliance until a qualified repair person can evaluate the situation. When the repair is completed, the postage paid tag can be dropped in the mail and returned to the fire district. In 2011, the fire district issued a total of 22 red tags.

This program provides a reliable channel of communication for repair technicians to identify the actions taken prior to their work. It also allows for the fire district to receive feedback on the exact nature of the problem once identified by the service technician. In appliances such as a fire alarm system, it also provides verification that the system has been returned to a normal operating condition.



Outdoor Warning Siren System

The Clearcreek Fire District monitors the operation of the outdoor warning siren system within Clearcreek Township and the City of Springboro. All eleven (11) sirens are tested monthly through activation by the Warren County Communications Center. Community volunteers and department personnel verify the operation of each siren. In the event a siren does not activate, a troubleshooting procedure is employed and any necessary repairs are coordinated.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) has mandated that mobile radio systems must begin operating in a narrowband configuration no later than January 1, 2013. This mandate affects the receiver on each warning siren that is responsible for processing the activation signal. The Clearcreek Fire District has contracted with Federal Field Services to upgrade the current outdoor warning sirens. Completion of the project is anticipated in early 2012.
