Clearcreek Township Division of Police 2015 Annual Report

2015 found Clearcreek Township remaining as not only one of the Safest Communities to live locally and in the State and Tri-State but now also garners attention for Safest Communities on a National Level.

Safwise and Bizjournales rated Clearcreek Township the 13th Safest Community to live in the State of Ohio. When further broken down to assess the category of mid-size cities with populations of 10-20 thousand, Clearcreek Township placed 6th Safest Community in the State of Ohio.

Safewise further rated Clearcreek Township as the 62^{nd} Safest Community in which to live, in the Nation. Cincy Magazine rated Clearcreek Township as the 6^{th} Safest Community to live in the Tri-State.

This continues Clearcreek Townships run of being in the Top 10 Safest Communities for the 9th year in a row.

We also continued our participation in the FOP countywide program, Shop with a Cop, benefiting families at Christmas Time with providing children with Christmas presents.

2015 saw the rollout of our Police Department's first ever Safety Town. Safety Town is a program where children ages 6-8 attend a 5 day class where they are taught safety issues by Police Officers. Some of the topics covered are: pedestrian safety, traffic signals, using 911, internet safety, stranger danger, school bus safety, fire safety, etc. The children are taught in a classroom and in a hands-on setting in a scaled down village. 194 children attended the program in 2015. This program is staffed by Officers of Clearcreek Township and Springboro Police Department. Members of the Clearcreek Township Fire Department and Springboro School System also assist in training components of the program.

Families walked the grounds of Patricia Allyn Park together as they visited the various booths and demonstrations put on by the Police Division, the Fire District and our area partners; including the Ohio State Highway Patrol, the Warren County Sheriff's Office, the Warren County Prosecutor's Office and others. Guests enjoyed the opportunity to meet and mingle with officers, and enjoy a hamburger or hot dog. The children enjoyed the numerous activities and safety stations that, this year, included a miniature version of the Clearcreek Township "Safety Town". The event was again coordinated by Officer Nicole Cordero under the direct supervision of Chief John Terrill. Officer Cordero has been planning this event for several years now and her efforts are greatly appreciated. There were many positive comments from participants and visitors. We look forward to the 2016 event, anticipating an even bigger event on August 2nd of this year.

5th Annual Polar Plunge at Caesar Creek

March 14, 2015 was another successful day for Ohio Special Olympics and Law Enforcement of Warren County. At approximately 1:30 pm more then 215 people ranging in age from 12 to 76 years of age participated in the 5th Annual Polar Plunge at Caesar Creek Lake. The water temperature was 33 degrees and the lake still had a layer of 5 inch thick ice in the center. This year's event raised over \$30,000 for Special Olympics Ohio. Sergeant Cornett was fortunate enough to plunge twice this year. During his second plunge, he escorted a Special Olympian from Butler County into the water.

Clearcreek Officers encouraged Five Points Elmentary School during their walk a thon this October. All the donations for this even helped fund school programs. We also got to see some great costumes!








Crash Statistics





In July 2010 the Clearcreek Township Division of Police was awarded international accreditation by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies. Then, in August of 2013 CALEA granted our agency reaccredited status. It is an honor that exemplifies the desires of Chief Terrill, the Township Administration, and the Trustees to provide quality police service to the citizens of Clearcreek Township.


Although CALEA sends a team of assessors every three years to verify our compliance with their standards, to maintain accreditation mandates continual self-assessment. Maintaining professionalism demands that we are continually evaluating our policies, our practices and ourselves. Accreditation forces us to look at what we do and how we do it, to look for improvements that we can make to how we provide police services and how we manage our people.

CALEA itself continues to change, as well. Not only are they continually looking for "best practice" revisions to their standards manual, but they are also adding new standards and deleting old ones as the law enforcement profession continually changes due to social, economic and technological reasons. CALEA is also making changes to its accreditation process. While many agencies have chosen to pursue the path of Basic Accreditation and the need to meet 170 CALEA standards, the Clearcreek Township Division of Police has still maintained Advanced Accreditation and continues to meet 481 standards. CALEA has also made it possible to go to a paperless accreditation process with their partnership with PowerDMS software. Clearcreek Township Police purchased this internet based software package at the end of 2014 and will using the software for our first paperless assessment in 2016.

In 2015 CALEA announced other changes to their process. Beginning with our 2016 assessment, Clearcreek Township will move to a four year assessment cycle. Rather than assessors being on-site every three years, they will be here every four. CALEA will then require on off-site review of one third of the standards annually. This will save the agency some on-site assessment expenses, but will force the accredited agency to stay on top of all standards for the annual off-site assessment. This process enhancement, allows CALEA to maintain high standards and accountability and yet, provide some savings to the agency.

Watch for an announcement this summer as to our success in reaching reaccredited status for the second time.




CALLS OVER THE PAST 10 YEARS


Domestic Violence Statistics

2015 Victims: 37% Male, 63% Female 2015 Offenders: 75% Male, 25% Female


2014 Victims: 22% Male, 78% Female 2014 Offenders: 88% Male, 12% Female




2015 Crime Reporting Statistics




2014 Crime Reporting Statistics




2013 Crime Reporting Statistics




2015 Summary of Calls

Internal Affairs Summary for 2015

To insure the integrity of its operations and personnel, the Clearcreek Township Division of Police investigates all allegations of police misconduct, regardless of their source. The Chief of Police is responsible for the Internal Affairs function of the agency. Investigations may be initiated by a citizen complaint or internally, by a supervisor or on the complaint of a fellow employee. Citizen complaint forms are available at the police department or by contacting a police supervisor.

In calendar year 2015 there was one (1) Internal Affairs investigation that originated from an internal complaint, after a complete investigation, no specific officer could be identified and there was no evidence of employee misconduct. There were no (0) investigations originating from citizen complaints. Police Department—Personnel Training

One of the goals of the Clearcreek Township Division of Police is to have well trained and professional Police Officers. In 2016 Officers made progress toward that goal. Officers are encouraged to take part in training through the Ohio Peace Officer Training Commission, local Law Enforcement Training Institutes as well as training offered through the Warren County Joint Training Team and in house training. Chief Terrill believes that it is important for all Officers to continue their career training, to enlarge their base of knowledge and skills, so that they may better serve the citizens of Clearcreek Township.
